

A peal for our church bells

The bells of St James the Great Snitterfield have been ringing out for hundreds of years. The oldest bell dates back to the 1700s. They have welcomed people to church services, for weddings, christenings and funerals and for national celebrations such as coronations, royal weddings, the Queen's 90th Birthday and the ending of wars. They were last rehung about 100 years ago. Meanwhile they have been tenderly cared for by the likes of the Bloxham family and more recently Michael Gray, who is sadly missed.

Now, however, they are due for a refurbishment. Taylors the Bell Foundry at Loughborough inspected them (see photo above) and estimated that it will require around £50,000 worth of work. The six bells will have to be taken down and rehung on new headstocks (the timber part from which the bell hangs) and retuned, together with no.3 bell (the oldest) being replaced with a more up-to-date bell which is more in tune with the other five. This new bell has been kindly donated by Sue Lambert who, incidently, is one of our newest recruits to bell ringing.

The largest bell, the tenor, weighs around 16 hundredweight and the lightest, the treble, weighs approximately six hundredweight. So it will be no mean feat to bring them down from the belfry to floor level and then transport them to Loughborough ... and eventually back again. When they return they will be easier to ring and sound more joyous than ever.

They will also be safer. So we need the help of Snitterfield villagers to raise the money for all this work. Hopefully you will have seen our fundraising efforts at the Village Fete and a good many of you will have joined us for the open day at the church on 27 July and been able to view the bells and maybe had a go at chiming them.

The sooner we can raise the money the sooner the work can begin. Your donations will be gratefully received: anything



from £1 to £1,500. The latter will sponsor a headstock with your name imprinted on it for future generations to read.

News from your County Councillor

Community Grants

The new Community Grants closed in June and we received an application from Snitterfield Village Hall. Announcements on the awards will be made later this month, but I can advise that this application scored well against the set criteria. Surprisingly there was a shortfall in grant submissions and therefore there will be a second round of grant applications held in September.

Delegated Members Road Safety Budget

A site meeting with the Road Safety Team was held in July to review vehicle speeding entering Kings Lane and the impact of pedestrians walking to The Farm and Monarch's Way. Following discussions with the officer he has come forward with a scheme which has been approved by the Parish



Council and is being funded from my Delegated Members Road Safety Budget at a cost of around £8,000.

The new safety measures include a signing/white lining scheme including pedestrian warning signs (see left), Slow markings, edge of carriageway markings and cycle way signing.

Road Closures

I have been contacted by some residents regarding their concerns in respect of the proposed road closure in School Lane from the end of July, which is also impacted by the closure of Bell Lane.

I have been working closely with WCC's Network Management Team together with a representative for Cadent Gas and they are liaising with the parish council to see how they can minimise the disruption to the residents. The closure of School Lane from 22 July has been requested by Cadent Gas to carry out essential gas works and the timing has been arranged to cause the least disruption during the school holidays.

News from your District Councillor

We are now comfortably into the new Council year and, following Annual Council in May, members of the various committees

have now been confirmed. Personally I am thrilled to have been given the Chairmanship of our Overview and Scrutiny Function which, as the committee title suggests, considers and scrutinises the decisions and performance of Council.

At Council on Monday 15 July there were two items of particular interest to both the Scrutiny Function and residents of the District. Council has received a petition from the public which seeks to declare a Climate Emergency in Stratford on Avon. That item is immediately followed by a cross part Motion on Notice seeking Council to investigate what we can do to combat Climate Change.

Such an investigation would normally be conducted by a Task and Finish (T&F) Group of the Overview and Scrutiny function. In an effort to expedite that work, we have already set up a T&F Group specifically to consider the matter of Climate Change. Not only that but the Committee was unanimous in its decision to include all parties represented at Council. That group will start its work imminently, with a report due back to Council by January 2020.

The second item of interest is our SAP (Site Allocations Plan) which follows the approval of our SHLAA (Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment) by Cabinet on 8 July. These documents form part of the suite of documents that support our Core Strategy and are vital in identifying reserve sites that could be used should the Council no longer be able to demonstrate a five-year land supply.

Provided the document is approved by Council, it will then be submitted to a planning inspector for examination and approval. Once approved the District will be in a stronger position in planning terms and should prevent successful appeals – particularly to larger development sites – on the basis of a lack of sufficient housing land supply.

Getting the garden ready for autumn

Gardens have performed well this summer with plants growing to phenomenal heights and roses blooming profusely. By mid August the mixed borders will

have reached a crescendo of colour. Nature certainly knows the most favourable moment to display her works. Autumn approaches rather like a grand finale in opera; everything blooming with the dazzling perennials, golden rudbeckia, orange crocosmia, penstemon, salvia spires, phlox and roses, dahlias flaunting their showy petals, fireworks of grasses and the quiver of fiery leaves before the curtain falls. The performance in the garden is over until the next show in the new year.

But for the gardener there is much to do:

- Lifting plants and potting up geraniums and others needing protection from frost;
- Gathering fruits and harvesting vegetables;
- Leave dahlias until the first frost. Then lift, shaking off the earth that holds the tubers, and dry before storing.
 Or cut them down, take a chance and cover them up;
- · Gather, dry and store flower seed;
- · Store onions;
- · Clear flower beds and compost the ground;
- · Divide perennials;
- · Out with old plants and replant with new;
- Cut deciduous hedges;
- Give wildflower patches the final cut.

Autumn is the best season to look closely at shapes and forms. It is also a good time for plotting and planting new trees, shrubs and perennials while the soil is still warm.

Hydrangea paniculata grandiflora is a great eye catching showpiece shrub as it performs in the late summer and lasts well into autumn. Consider planting a new tree or shrub to provide autumn colour. Amelanchier lamarckii, Acer palmatum 'Sango-kaku' and Cercis canadensis Forest Pansy give fantastic displays. Plant daffodils and early flowering crocus, muscari, hyacinths and surprise treasures like autumn crocus and cyclamen in little groups to delight as autumn fades. But wait to plant tulips until late November to early December to avoid fungal disease.

Visit gardens at their best in the autumn to see the beauty, smell the air and kick the leaves. Batsford Arboretum (near Moreton in the Marsh) or Westonbirt Arboretum have wonderful displays. Visit the michaelmas daisy gardens at Colwall towards Malvern or Packwood House with its stunning late summer borders.





Producing festivals and events both here in the UK and abroad is my fulltime job, so it seemed a good idea to create one in my home village.

The concept for Snitt Life was to create a music festival of which the village could be proud and an opportunity for the community to come together against the backdrop of live music.

Ticket proceeds go directly to the newly formed Snitterfield Community Project Fund, a completely transparent fund set up to help finance key projects within the village. So far from just two events, the Boperator Boogie Band party night in April and Snitt Life, a total of over £5,000 has be raised which, in this instance, will cover the costs of installing a new centrally located AED (defibrillator machine) in the village.

Producing an event like Snitt Life to a certain production standard obviously has cost attachments, despite many elements such as stage, lighting and sound being hugely discounted by the suppliers. These production costs are very much eased by the financial support of the festival's Company Community partners who invest in the festival, which in turn allows us to produce a safe, impressive and enjoyable event.

We would like to thank everyone who bought tickets, came and partied and the Community Company Partners: Shred Pro, CASS, ICM, Callingham Architects, Molson Compact and Shebang Design & Marketing. We are also very grateful to the Sports and Social Club and the brilliant team of village volunteers who helped put the festival on and to SACC for managing the rubbish in a totally environmentally-friendly way.

Blooming memories of days gone by

Having recently visited Snitterfield and talked to some of the residents we thought *Snipe* may be interested in our time in the village in the 1970s. At that time we managed Snitterfield Garden Centre at The Wolds on The Green. We lived in the bungalow where our daughter Caroline was born in 1971.

The old farm buildings around the courtyard were the garden centre. The corner one was The Elizabethan Tea Rooms, which was very popular and frequented by the actors from the RSC, including Judy Dench and her husband Michael Williams and Elizabeth Croft (postmistress in *Crossroads*). In the garden centre our customers included actors Brenda Bruce and Eric Porter. In the late 1960s and early 1970s garden centres were still new to Britain and we were only the seventh in Britain to be awarded International Garden Centre status - not bad for little Snitterfield!

The walled garden behind the Wolds was the plant area and we converted the old tennis court into a pets' corner. The owner, Mrs Ladds (who lived in the Wolds), went on holiday to Majorca and came back with photographs of a wonderful crazy golf course – we were asked to build it using the photos – so we did! The ground dropped here and I was able to use this bank to make a waterfall which went under a bridge and meandered through the site. In those days we felt we could do anything and our time at Snitterfield was the happiest of our lives.

Tea Rooms OPEN

Sadly Mrs Ladds became very ill and this led to blindness and the demise of the garden centre. We had only been married a year on coming to Snitterfield and still quite fervent Scots (we are now fully Anglicised) so we named the bungalow Arden Vohr (Arden View) since we were in the old Forest of Arden. We were delighted to see that the name remains.



Is there anybody in Snitterfield who remembers the garden centre and may have worked in the tea rooms with Miss Easterbook?

We would be happy for anyone who remembers those days to contact us and perhaps we could meet up when next we visit Stratford.
